Where the court house is now was a stone building which was the seat of learning for the village and district, and many eminent men and women received their early education there, sometimes to the tune of the hickory stick. Many are the stories of those school days told by my older brothers and sisters. The boys and girls of those days may have lived to become ornaments to society and a credit to their professions, but were evidently as a full of pranks as those of the present day.

The First teacher I knew in the stone schoolhouse was Miss Annie Russell; then Mr. McLaughlin, and Mr. Harmon Hunt. The last teacher in that building was Mr. Edward Johnson, father of Mrs. Suffel. Beside the schoolhouse was the home of the Wm. Robinson family, later occupied by Sidney Bush, miller.



Owned by ? Harold Russell: used as a barber shop by Bill Halladay. Bryce Preston & wife lived upstairs. After used as a library and demolished 1999


There was a private school kept by Mr. Cosgrove upstairs in the frame building where now is the Russell Block. The lower story was a general store owned by Mr. Russell.




At one time the Post Office was kept in the old stone store by a Mr. Pross; then it was taken over by Prod.

Denaut, in the building now owned by Jas. Sexton and J. E. Brown followed him as postmaster.

The house occupied by Milton Steele was once the property of a Mr. MacDonald who owned most of the block on which it stands. Next was the home of Mr. Tompkins, builder and stone-mason. Dr. Imeson once lived in a house where the Sweets now live, and Dr. Sinclair for many years lived across the street from there.







Sexton House 1960s








The grist mill is among the oldest buildings in the village; and in my young days was owned by Walter Denaut.

Denaut and was the Town Hall, Clerk's office, and was the scene of concerts, socials and such events.










The building now occupied by Mr. Whitmore's shop was the home of the Birch family. Mr. Birch carried on a tailoring business.





Before the building of the brick block, there were several small frame buildings, one a little grocery kept by Mr. Taylor, great grandfather of W. A. Bell; another was the shoe shop of Jno. Hazelton whose house was across from the hotel. That hostelry was operated at various times by Henry Mott, a Mr. Gill, J. L. Joynt, and others.












Where Mr. Halladay's shop is now was Alex Stevens' carriage shop, employing several men, and sending out carriages of all kinds to all parts of the country. Next was the store of J. A. Bell which is still Bell's store.





Across from the Bell's store was a hotel, long conducted by the Comstocks. On the opposite corner was the fine residence of Wm. Bell, Jr., and on the next corner was the home of the Connor family

The Denaut family lived on the hill where the Morris family now live. That place was known as "The House" and was the scene of many pleasant gatherings. In winter that hill was a delightful place for coasting and was much enjoyed by old and young. The boys and girls from school used to gather at the top of the hill (there was no street open there then) and slide through a single gate, just wide enough to pass a hand sleigh—if it were well steered.






The Davison Family


